Welcome back!

Maryland Day is scheduled for Saturday, April 27th. Mark your calendars and come visit us from 10-4 pm. GVPT, CAPC, SADAT and CIDCM/MIDCM will be stationed in front of Tydings. If you would like to volunteer to work the tent that day, please send Cissy your t-shirt size and the hours you can participate by February 22nd. We would love to have you join us.

We have received new information on <u>Activity Insight</u>, the program we will be using to file our faculty activity reports (FAR's). Activity Insight is being rolled out in phases to tenured/tenure-track faculty across campus throughout 2019. Two groups of faculty will be trained in the Spring term, and a third group will be trained early in the Fall term. Administrators who will use Activity Insight for reporting purposes, and the staff who support them, will be trained over the summer. The end goal is for all tenured/tenure-track faculty to use Activity Insight for the annual activity reporting cycle in the Spring of 2020. Our professional track faculty will use Activity Insight in the Spring of 2021.

BSOS is part of the second rollout group, and there will be a variety of informational and training opportunities for both the faculty and staff:

- 1. The initial focus in April will be an orientation to staff so they are aware of what faculty will be asked to do with Activity Insight.
- 2. Following that orientation, Faculty Affairs will be holding one or more faculty training sessions in campus locations close to Tydings in the April/May timeframe. When this training is offered, I HIGHLY recommend that you make every effort to attend.
- 3. In addition to in-person training, Faculty Affairs will also have drop-in office hours at their Toll Physics suite and an online portal with additional documentation and short how-to videos for self-service instruction.

You have been sent an email asking that you complete the Outside Professional Activities (OPA) Report and you can access the report at http://ares.umd.edu. Once on the ARES website, go to "Quick Links" and select "Outside Professional Activities (OPA) Report." The University of Maryland policy and procedures on Conflict of Interest and Conflict of Commitment require that all full-time exempt staff complete this report. The form must be completed, even if there are no outside professional activities to report. The OPA report reporting period is from January 1, 2018 to December 31, 2018. The university deadline for completion is Friday, March 1, 2019, but you know the College will give us an earlier deadline (pending that email), so Cissy and I would appreciate it if you just go ahead and get this done and out of your way.

But, are Black women really magic? Popular hashtags like #BlackGirlMagic do not do the work of explaining the centuries of wisdom, labor and ingenuity that have put black women in a position to do the longsufferi9ng and thankless work that looks to outsiders like 'magic'. The digital provides a site to explore the unique interlocking systems of oppression historically enacted upon Black women. I argue that Black women's relationship with communication technology informs a circumstance of its use that inherently is the most generative.
