All materials should be submitted to Ann Marie. The deadline for nomination is October 15, 2016.

Discussion leaders are assigned on a rotating basis, matching papers with discussants who share complementary research interests. It provides an excellent opportunity to interact with the American Politics faculty outside of the classroom and, for advanced graduate students actively engaged in scholarly research, the workshop can also be an invaluable source of professional advice.
