MAKE-UP EXAMS (Proctoring)

#### **RETURNING STUDENT PAPERS**

Leaving papers out for the students to flip through is a violation of student privacy. The best suggestion is to ask the students to provide a self addressed and stamped envelope and you will return the papers to them.

Not only is this a violation of the Policy on the Acceptable Use of Information Technology Resources (<a href="http://www.nethics.umd.edu/aup/">http://www.nethics.umd.edu/aup/</a>), but also could cause much disruption to you, your colleagues, and our students. Such disruptions may be as serious as multi-building wide network outages (i.e., entire building data and voice services become unavailable).

If such a device is found on the network (i.e., a wired or wireless device that can hand out IP addresses) the device owner will be referred to the Division of IT's Security Office and their device will be confiscated.

If you have needs that you feel the campus network cannot fulfill, please contact OACS. We will work with you and our network and security offices to devise a networking solution that works for you, yet is in compliance with the campus' security rules and regulations.
