It provides an excellent opportunity to interact with the American Politics faculty outside of the classroom and, for advanced graduate students actively engaged in scholarly research, the workshop can also be an invaluable source of professional advice. Center for American Politics and Citizenship (CAPC)

The spring semester is underway, and we have a record number of students participating in our internship program this spring. We have over 40 students placed in internships in Maryland and Washington, D.C. Some highlights include, over 20 students interning at the General Assembly, 6 students interning in congressional offices, 3 students interning in embassies, and 1 student interning at the White House.

In early December we hosted our undergraduate research symposium to a packed house.





In mid-December one of our graduate assistants, SoRelle Wyckoff, wrote an analysis seeking to answer the question <u>"Should Congressional Incumbents be Concerned About the 2018 Midterm Elections?"</u> Using data from our <u>joint poll with the Washington Post</u>, analysis found that when compared with Congressional Democrats, Congressional Republicans are at a disadvantage.

Our director, Stella Rouse, was selected to join the board of <u>Women Also Know Stuff</u>, a nonprofit whose goal is to promote and publicize the work and expertise of scholars in political science who identify as women. She was also recently quoted in an NBC News Latino article titled, <u>"Though dejected, immigration activists renew fight for Dreamer deal."</u> Our research director, Michael Hanmer, was interviewed for a <u>U.S. News & World Report article</u> about our nation's image abroad and findings from our joint poll with the Washington Post.

Lastly, our former board member Susan Turnbull joined Democratic gubernatorial candidate Ben Jealous as his running mate for the 2018 election.
